A secure home helps fight break-ins

Thieves are anywhere that tempta-tions exist and many take advantage of additional opportunities made possible by a careless homeowner.

According to national statistics, in over 25 percent of nearly three-million homes burglarized last year, illegal entry was gained through an open or unlocked door.

Farmington Hills exceeded the na-tional average during the first six months of 1985, when 37 percent of res-idential burglaries resulted by way of

an exterior door which was left un secured.

For that rea-son, when consid-ering your home security, you should concen-trate on the following suggestions, which will help you secure this major point of access into your home:

Replace or reinforce all exte-

If unable to easily walk into a home, many burglars will persist in their ef-forts to enter a residence by physically compromising a door, frame or lock.

rior door. The ideal door is of hollow-core metal or solid wood construction, which is at least one and three quarters thick. Since many existing doors are hollow-core wood and are not strong enough to withstand brute force, it is best that these doors be replaced. If that is not possible, reinforce the door by attaching a half-inch-thick sheet of plywood, with long wood screws, to the inside of the door. An alternate measure would be to cover the door with sheet metal. All solid wood or metal exterior doors should be equipped with a 180-degree, wide-angle door viewer

to provide visual identification of the caller prior to opening the door. Since they are relatively inexpensive, these viewers can be installed at more than one height in a door for each member of your household to use.

• Reinforce decorative panels. An exterior door with decorative wood panels, beveled down to an one-quarter-inch thickness, may be aesthetically appealing but are also prone to attack. These panels can be easily forced or kicked out and in many cases, allow an area large enough for a small person to crawl through or just reach in to

unlock the door. Next to replacing this type of door, consideration abould be given to protecting these weak areas in the same manner you would to reinforce sollow-core wood door.

Saleguard glass inserts are easy largets, all glass inserts are easy largets, all glass should be eliminated or given special attention particularly if the glass is located within 40 inches of the locks on the door, Glass inserts can be protected by mounting a piece of wrought iron grillwork, break resistant polycarbonate panel, or security film to the inside of the glass portions in the door.

Install good locks. All exterior doors require a quality single-cylinder deadbolt lock (The Farmington Hills Police Department does not recommend the installation of the double cylinder deadbolt lock in residential use or the first policy of this device can prevent escape during an emergency). • Check your door frames. A door and lock is only as strong as the frame it fits into. Most often a door can be forced open by leverage of a crowbar inserted between the door and the inserted between the door and the frame, or more simply gr a well-placed kick. For proper security, there should be no more than a one-sighth-inch clearance between the door and the frame. Also, a door hung on a rotted frame can be easily forced open so lessure to repair any areas that show aigus of deterioration. 
