Grant seeks vote recount

Grant said he believes the greatest number of inaccuracles take place when absentee ballots are used. Residents who are voting absentee have to match names on a separate ballot with a punch card.

"That gives me the feeling that II there in an inaccuracy, it is in the absentee ballots, They (voters) are not able to line them (ballot and punch eard) up," Grant said.

AFTER LOSING his council seat to Marks fol-lowing a recount last year, Sever is prepared to battle for his two-year term. Unlike last year, Sever this time plans to have representatives on hand while the county canvassers recount the votes.

Under state law, bipartisan canvassers check ballots by hand. Chads — the rectangular perforations on the punch eard ballots — are checked to be sure they are properly detached. At least two corners of the four-cornered chad must be detached for it to be counted as a vote. Once the ballots have been hand-checked, votes are totaled by computer. After losing to Marks in the recount, bever took the issue to Oakland Circuit Court. He asked Circuit Judge Alice Gilbert to Intercede and declare the recount unconstitutional. Through his attorney, Sever argued that the process of recounting punch card ballots is unconstitutional.

But about fourth months after the recount, Gilbert roiled that the state Legislature provided a process of recounting election ballots that, while not infallible, is constitutional.

Ducks are unable to fly during the summer while their wings are molting in preparation for fall migration. Hayden said. Male ducks lose their bright colors during this summer period "nature's way of camouflaging."

The early fall, flight wings molt into winter plumage," Hayden said.

Unlike drake decoys, dull-colored decoy hens must portray
subtleness with brown and gray colors. It's often easier portraying a hen than a drake. Achleving realism with flashy drake
colors is especially difficult, according to Hayden.

CARVING A decoy duck out of bass wood begins with a pat-tern. The duck's outline is drawn on a piece of wood, then sawed and sanded into shape. A decoy's body and head require sepa-rate pieces of wood. Once the wood is smooth, feathers are added to the surface, Hayden said. Hayden use a Fordham flexible shaft — a moter-driven tool similar to a dentist's instrument — to create characteristic pat-finess and velning on the decoy's feathers. The final step is painting the decoy as realistically as possible and glueing the glass eyes into place. Hayden mixes acrylic paints to achieve the realistic colors he prefers.

Creating waterfowl graphics for duck stamps is another pet project. Duck stamps are affixed on the back of small game hunting licenses. Hunters must purchase the stamp along with a fleeses. A man who pursues the work he likes, Hayden has found that even as an independent artist, deadlines and demand for his work keep pouring in. His one regret is that he spends more time painting then carving.
