Vocal scholarships offered to students

Five high school vocal music students will be awarded scholarships of \$335 to attend an in-state music camp.

This second annual scholarship program available to Macomb, Oakland and Wayne county students is sponsored by Macabees Mutual Life Insurance Co. and the Madrigal Chorus of Southfield.

Competition will take place during December, January and February.

Winners will be offered an opportunity to participate in a 1986-87 Michigan Opera Theater Production.

In order to be eligible, students must be 14-18 years of age and presently enrolled in a public or private high school, grades 9-12. They must hold amateur status.

Applicants are asked to submit two selections on cassette tape.

A repertoire list will be provided

from which one selection will be required, and another will be the applicant's choice. One selection must be in English, the other in a foreign language.

Tapes must be postmarked by Dec. 6 and mailed to MCS Vocal Scholarship Competition, PO Box 3194, Southfield, Mich. 48037. Audition tapes will not be returned.

Sixteen finalists will be selected by a panel of judges from the Madrigal Chorus by Jan. 10. Finalists will then compete in a live performance at Southfield-Lathrup High School on Feb. 6 before a panel of outside judges.

Winners will be announced the day of the final competition and will receive their awards at the final concert of the Madrigal Chorus on April 28, at Christ Church of Cranbrook.

The Rorantists have performed in West Germany, France, Holland, West Berlin and the United States. They've

appeared on television in the United States and Holland and have recorded in West Berlin. Their records include a collection of early Polish music and a videocassette of Polish Christmas carols. Cassettes are available at the concert and the campus bookstore.

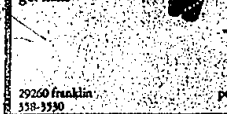
