

Raiders pinned, Falcons roll

When things got heavy, North Farmington got started Thursday.

However, the late surge still wasn't enough to overtake Livonia Churchill as the Chargers came away with a 36-30 triumph in Western Lakes wrestling action.

Churchill (2-0) took four of the first five matches but the Raiders (0-2) ran a string of wins in seven of the last eight bouts. The key for the Chargers was that all of their wins came on pins.

Brian Clemens' pin in the 167-pound bout clinched the victory.

For Churchill, other pins came from Darin Dudek (98), Pete Leventis (105), Salem Yaffai (119) and Derek Verant (128).

North, which countered with four pins, was also aided by decision wins by Paul Cook (138), Mark Cassar (155) and Brian Haack (heavyweight), Gary Evangelista (112), Pat Gallina (145), Mike Temple (185) and Ziem Czumala (198).

JOHN GLENN 48, CANTON 24: The Rockets ran their record to 3-0 with Thursday's victory over host Plymouth Canton in a Western Lakes dual meet.

Westland John Glenn, with four matches decided on pins coming under a minute, wasted little time against the Chiefs. Dan Schirinsky needed only 15 seconds to win his 145-pound bout.

Daryl Hooley (105), Ben Chafin (188) and Chris Zimmerman (heavyweight) also completed their

matches in less than a minute.

Other Rockets who won by pins included Dwayne Lacanaria (119) and Mark Kropp (167).

Steve Ebejer (98), Dave Dunford (112), Troy McCall (155) and Mike Wallace (185) all won their matches for Canton (0-2).

STEVENSON 43, HARRISON 20: If it weren't for the results, the result might have been closer in Livonia Stevenson's triumph over Farmington Harrison Tuesday in Western Lakes action.

The Hawks (0-3) spotted the Spartans 24 points as they didn't have enough wrestlers to compete in four matches. In nine bouts, Harrison won five and tied one.

For the Hawks, Bruce Hinzman (112), Paul Gedeft (119), Pat Dugas (167), Pat McFadden (185) and Mark Bonasso (198) all claimed victories.

Stevenson had wins from Glen Caney (98), Tom Tokarz (138) and Pat Berry (145) in addition to the four matches won on pins.

Earlier in the week, Harrison lost a double-dual meet with Walled Lake Central (48-20) and Southfield (48-22). McFadden, who has registered three pins already this season, won both of his matches as

did Cliff Alcantara. Dugas registered a decision win and a tie.

FARMINGTON 50, FRANKLIN 18: From the 132-pound match on, the Falcons were unstoppable Thursday as they pounded the Patriots in a Western Lakes dual meet.

Farmington (2-0), which lost the first two bouts on pins, ran a string of eight wins in the last eight matches. With the exception of Craig Lapanonaki's win for Livonia Franklin in the 128-pound match, the Falcons didn't yield a victory.

Six of the 10 Falcons won came on pins as Gary Blair (132), Tim Waker (155), Mike Kelly (167), John Augustin (185), Dan Pariso (198) and Bill Critcher (bwt) all put their opponent's back to the mat.

T.J. Armstrong (112), Steve Lee (119), and Mike Cody (138) won on decisions for Farmington.

CATHOLIC CENTRAL 36, DAVISON 33: The Shamrocks raised their season record to 5-0 Thursday with a narrow win at Davison.

Judd Synder's 47 second pin in the 198-pound match wrapped up match for CC.

Other CC wrestlers scoring pins included Brendan Rock (105), Jason Wiebeck (119), Lee Krueger (167) and Kevin Tulley (185).

Chris Inch of Farmington led the way with a second-place finish with a time of 15:59. The other runners who scored points in that age group included Neil DeFord of Lathrup (fifth), Al Stebbins of Farmington (sixth), Seth Brown of Madison Heights (eighth), Bruce Irvine of Warren De La Salle (ninth) and Jim Huff of Bloomfield Hills Lahser (tenth).

The 17-18 boys team also took first with a score of 35 points.

The boys were led by Royal Oak Kimball graduate Geoff Goolsby, who is now running at Macomb Community College. He was first overall with a time of 15:40.

Linda Pilar of Fraser, Liz Lange of Birmingham Groves and Sue Kania from Center Line led the 17-18 girls team to a third-place overall finish.

Robert Huff of Bloomfield Hills Middle School finished 11th in the 13-14 boys age division, while Brock Harvey of Detroit Country Day School took eighth overall in the 11-12 boys division.

Ladywood settles score with Rouge

Stock in the Livonia Ladywood girls basketball team rose dramatically Thursday night.

The Blazers paid big dividends Thursday night, recapturing the Class B title that it yielded by a point last season, holding defending state champion River Rouge and star forward Frantha Price in check to capture the regional crown at Harper Woods Lutheran East with a 64-45 triumph.

"We've won four regional titles in a row, but this was the most thrilling," said Ladywood coach Ed Kavanaugh.

The market opens again Wednesday for the Blazers, who will face Flint Beecher in a state quarterfinal game at 7:30 p.m. at Warren Pilsner-High School. The winner advances to Friday's semifinals in Kalamazoo.

THE 5-FOOT-9 PRICE, considered one of the top players in the country, led all scorers with 18 points (on 9 of 19 shooting), but the senior forward failed to control the game like she did in last year's 47-46 state championship win.

"Our strategy is that we figured Price would get her points no matter how we guarded her," Kavanaugh said. "But we didn't want her to get any three-point plays and we wanted to stop everybody else."

Ladywood's portfolio read impressively as all five starters played key roles in the victory.

Sue LaBerte and Debbie Layinski, a pair of 6-foot seniors, teamed up to control the boards and tally 15 and 14 points, respectively.

"We got some key offensive rebounds," Kavanaugh said. "Our strategy was to send Sue and Debbie inside and really pound the boards."

"Debbie had the game of her life. She got rebounds and made foul shots (7 of 8)."

As a team, Ladywood made 22 of 27 free throws.

Rouge, meanwhile, hit only 3 of 7.

"THEY DID EVERYTHING I asked for," said the Ladywood coach. "They executed the game plan exactly the way we wanted."

Rouge, befuddled by Ladywood's switching defenses, fell behind by as many as 15 points early in the fourth quarter before making a futile run in the final minutes. The Panthers pulled within six, 51-45, with 30 seconds left, but it was too little, too late.

"The only time I told them about last year's game was in the fourth quarter," Kavanaugh said. "But other than that we mentioned nothing at all about last year."

Ladywood's backcourt duo of Jenny Nadeau and Cathy Schram kept the pressing Panthers from making a big run. The two also combined for 9 of 11 free throws and 10 points.

Meanwhile, the aging hero was forward Mary Joy Kozzal, who added eight points. But more importantly, it was her task to shadow Price when the Blazers used their man-to-man defense.

"It took us awhile to get started," said Rouge coach Benford Pierce, whose team bowed out with a 22-1 record. "We just seemed to play in spurts."

"But even when we got down, we never gave up. I told them they'll always be my girls."

THE BLAZERS, sporting a 24-1 record, could have one more score to settle if they reach the state finals — that would be with Dearborn Divine Child, which beat Ladywood recently for the Catholic League championship.

"I wish this (beating Rouge) was the state championship game," Kavanaugh said, "but we still have to play three games left to go."

"All we wanted to do was play well — and we did. We've got five people who can score and this is a fun group. I've never had a more enjoyable year of coaching."

Things are certainly looking bullish for the Blazers.



A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Pro-Tem Bennett at 8:00 p.m. on December 2, 1985, in Council Chambers, 35600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Bennett, Campbell, Hartsock (arrived at 8:10 p.m.), Tupper, Yoder.

OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Director Lauboff, City Clerk Busley.

Minutes of previous meeting were approved.

Council granted the requested sign variance of Sara Beckman, 33145 Grand River, designated January 17, 1986 as LEW SCHULMAN DAY.

Council elected not to participate in the Oakland County Solid Waste Disposal Agreement.

Council introduced Ordinance C-515-85 which would amend Title IX, Chapter 90, Sec. 9.141, Farmington's Police Department.

Council approved CBD Task Force and local merchants joint holiday lighting venture.

Council established a Public Hearing at 8:00 p.m. on December 16, 1985 to review the 1985 Continuously Development Block Grant Program and the Commercial Assistance Loan Program.

Council approved the expenditure of \$45,138 to participate in the Oakland County Tri-Party Program.

Council approved payment of \$62,022.45 to Italia Construction, Inc., for work completed to date on the 1985 Sidewalk Program.

Public comments were heard.

Council approved the Mayor's member appointments to Boards and Commissions.

Council received the General Fund and 4th District Court Financial Reports for the four months ended October 31, 1985.

The following ordinances were adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-515-85

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON BY ADDING A NEW SECTION WHICH NEW SECTION SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 8.28 OF CHAPTER 185 OF TITLE X, TRAFFIC, OF SAID CODE.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Chapter 185 Traffic

8.28 Vehicles For Sale (ADD the following provision)

No person shall park any vehicle, motorcycle, trailer or recreational vehicle for the principal purpose of offering same "For Sale", in any public or privately owned parking lot. This would include but would not be limited to automobile service stations and commercial parking lots, or any area normally open to the public but not licensed as an automobile sales area. In any prosecution or proceedings under this section, the registration plate displayed on a motor vehicle shall constitute in evidence a prima facie presumption that the registered owner of such vehicle was the person responsible for parking such vehicle at the place where such violation occurred. A person who violates this section is guilty of a civil infraction.

This Ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 18, 1985, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on December 2, 1985, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.

ORDINANCE NO. C-516-85

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 8.61 OF CHAPTER 88 OF TITLE IX, POLICE REGULATIONS OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Chapter 88 Narcotics

8.61 subsection 3-A (AMEND the following provision)

In any area zoned for residential and/or commercial purposes no person in charge of any property whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee or otherwise shall allow the storage of any junk automobiles except in a completely enclosed building. For the purpose of this section junk automobiles shall include any partially dismantled, inoperable, wrecked or discarded vehicles. This shall also include any vehicles without current license plates or any vehicle that is not equipped with operational equipment as required in the Michigan Motor Vehicle Code, Act No. 360 of the Public Acts of 1949 as amended. No person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the City for a period of time in excess of seventy-two (72) hours. Except that a vehicle may remain on the property of a licensed automobile repair service for a period of time not to exceed sixty (60) days and only when said vehicle is not owned by the repair service. However, this section shall not be applicable to automobile sales and/or rental areas or scrap or automobile junk yard when properly licensed under the provisions of this Code. Enforcement of this subsection shall be in accordance with subsection (b) of 8.61.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 18, 1985, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on December 2, 1985, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.

ORDINANCE NO. C-517-85

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDERS

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

That the Traffic Control Order issued by the Chief of Police of the City of Farmington, dated February 1, 1973, is hereby amended as follows: Chapter 10 Section 10.10 and Chapter 13 Section 13.7 as provided for in Section 2.63 of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages.

CHAPTER 10 "FIRE ROUTES"
Section 10.10

Add the following:
CROSSROADS SHOPPING CENTER
(a) All driveways, alleys, or other areas posted as fire routes in the Crossroads Shopping Center located at the northeast corner of Nine Mile and Farmington Roads.

CHAPTER 13 "HANDICAPPED PARKING"
Section 13.7

Add the following:
CROSSROADS SHOPPING CENTER
(a) All parking areas designated for handicapped parking only in the area located in the southwest corner of Nine Mile and Farmington Roads.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 18, 1985, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on December 2, 1985, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.
