

St. Paul To Dedicate New Church And School

St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church, a Livonia institution nearly 100 years old, will dedicate its new sanctuary and school with special services Sunday, Sept. 13, and Sunday, Sept. 20.

The new church home, valued at \$350,000 in construction costs and probably close to \$700,000 in all, is located at 17810 Farmington Road, north of Six Mile.

Until early this summer, the church was located on Farmington Road south of Five Mile. The former location has been turned over to the city of Livonia for a Senior Citizens Activities Center.

The Rev. W.F. Koelpin is pastor of the church that had held its services at the Five Mile-Farmington Road site for nearly a century.

Dedication services are planned at 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Sept. 13 and at 8:30 and 11 a.m. Sept. 20.

Pastor Oscar Naumann, of Milwaukee, president of the Wisconsin Synod of Lutheran churches which includes St. Paul, will be speaker in the morning dedication Sept. 13.

Daniel Koelpin, a senior at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, will be guest officiant.

IN THE AFTERNOON, the guest speaker will be the Rev. Waldemar Zaring, president of the Michigan district of the Wisconsin synod, speaking on "Blessing God with our church home." The guest officiant will be Philip Koelpin, a vicar in Phoenix, Ariz.

Professor Arnold Koelpin of D. r. Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minn., will be guest speaker for the Sept. 20 services, when education will be the main theme.

The new church plant, which went into planning stages three and a half years ago, includes a sanctuary that seats 200 with a choir balcony to seat 40.

Contemporary design of the sanctuary gives it an open character to facilitate serving of communion. A stained glass window designed by the famed Jacques Dural is above the

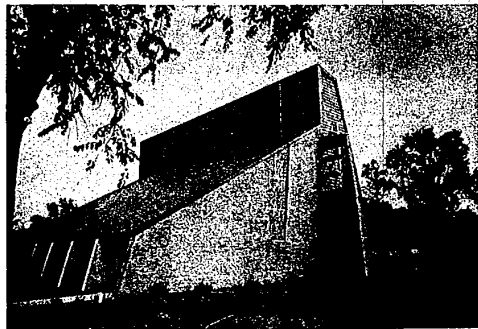
alter, and on either side are panels of antique verde marble with designs in gold leaf.

Oiled walnut is used for pulpits, pews and other furnishings.

The bell from the former church is a prominent part of the exterior design.

Also in the building are five

classrooms, a multipurpose room that can be used as a gym, locker and shower rooms, a kitchen and a special teen room.
