Top on the recommended priority list is a 4-H Youth

Activities Center, to be con-structed at the Springfield Oaks Park in Davisburg. The present property of the 4-li Center, was obtained in 1914 as part of tax-reverted land. Space limitations make the site unsuitable for an expanded youth program.

Total estimated construction cost is \$627,000 and facilities are designed to serve other recreational and educational programs operated by the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission.
