# Sacred Heart hosts open house Feb. 2

Academy of the Sacred Heart will host an Open House 2-4 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 2, for prospective students in pre-kindergarten through grade 12. Sister Martha Roughan, headmistress of the academy, will deliver a welcoming ad-dress at 2 p.m. in the school auditori-um.

The academy is an independent, Catholic college preparatory day school for boys and girls in pre-kinder-garten through grade 4 and for girls only in grades 5-12. The Open House will offer guests the opportunity to visit classrooms, discover the curriculum and meet the faculty and students.

The upper school offers advanced placement courses, a student exchange program, a required community service program, and project term, an independent learning project, in addition to the regular college-preparatory curriculum.

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Four scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic merit each year in the upper school.

Applicants for grades 9-12 are encouraged to take the academy's high school scholarship and entrance exam given every fall.

The school is administered by the Religious of the Sacred Heart and educates students of varied faiths and backgrounds from 39 Detroit metropolitan communities. The academy, which was established in 1851, is part of an international network of 220 Sacred Heart Schools and colleges, and is one of the oldest continuing independent schools in Michigan.

Financial aid for qualified applicants is awarded annually on the basis of need.
