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Clareville teachers went back to classes Wednesday under a new one-year contract worth about 9.88 per cent more across the board.

The Clareville Education Association, bargaining agent for the teachers, failed to get an "agency shop" provision, according to William Waters, high school counselor who is CEA president.

Tuesday morning's ratification vote was 89-54. "It was the closest we've ever had, but it indicated a majority felt they could live with this contract," said Waters.

SALARY range for a teacher with a bachelor's degree is \$5,000 to \$10,000 compared to last year's \$7,400 to \$11,700. Range for the master's degree is \$8,500 to \$14,500 compared to last year's \$7,000 to \$12,500.

It will still take 12 steps to reach the maximum rate. Waters said the teachers

won binding arbitration as the final step in the grievance procedure and, in general, improved due process provisions.

OTHER CEA gains:

- Increased personal and sick leaves.
- Bereavement leave of three days.

- Layouts on the bases of age and seniority if these should become necessary due to declining enrollments. Clareville this year expected an increased high school enrollment, a stable junior high enrollment but a decrease at the elementary level for a net decrease of 46 pupils district-wide.

- Generally improved teaching and working conditions.

Supt. David McDowell, agreeing with Waters' summary of the contract, said it was a "compromise" agreement.

More experienced teachers appear to have done better, percentage-wise, than beginners under the new contract.

Park Chain Attendance Takes Dip

Over 1,417,610 visitors used Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority parks in August of 1970 compared to 1,432,255 in August of 1969, which was a decline of about 14,645 visitors for the month.

David O. Laidlaw, authority director, noted that in August of 1969 three of the four major parks of the authority had record attendance due to "month-long" hot weather.

Stony Creek Metropolitan Park near Utica had the highest August attendance of any HCMA park with a record figure of over 365,800 in August of 1970 compared to 318,000 for August of 1969, which was the previous high for the month.

METROPOLITAN BEACH near Mt. Clemens had 358,600 visitors in August of 1970, a slight drop from the "record high" of over 388,300 visitors for the same month of 1969.

Kensington Metropolitan Park near Milford had 353,000 visitors, a drop of 68,600 visitors from the "record high" of 420,600 persons coming to the park in August of 1969.

Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville had 266,000 visitors in August of 1970 compared to 242,500 in August of 1969. This is the park's second-best attendance for the month since 281,000 persons used the park in August of 1961.

HCMAs parks in Washtenaw County had a total attendance of 75,238 compared to 62,755 in August of 1969.

Professional Man's Course Given By OU

Professional men, especially doctors and dentists, increasingly are considering the corporate form of business operation for themselves. The important factors and the problems of going corporate will be given a comprehensive review in a new evening course offered by Oakland University's Continuing Education Division.

"Doctors and dentists need to know the reasons for the corporate form of business operation," says attorney Neal L. Grossman, who will conduct discussions for the course.

Grossman will emphasize business, estate and tax planning for professional men as well as point out the advantages and disadvantages of corporate structure. What constitutes a proper pension and profit sharing plan and what such plans can mean to the professional also will be covered.

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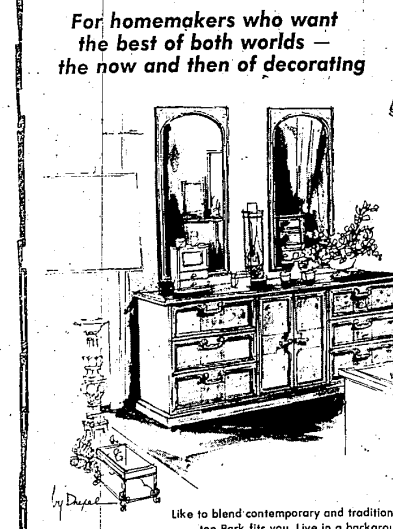
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
