

Make Push For Hospital

Organized efforts are now being made to obtain community support for a proposed regional medical hospital to be located in Farmington Township.

Representatives from the Farmington Area Jaycees were at Monday night's Farmington Township board meeting to explain what role Jaycees will play in seeking community support.

The Jaycees told trustees Monday night their organization would begin a petition drive, with the big push starting Oct. 1. It also obtained signatures indicating public support.

Jaycees presenting their plans to the township board were Robert Beauchamp, Tom McFarland and Gordon Page.

THE TRIO TOLD trustees the Jaycees are about to launch a petition drive throughout the Farmington Area to obtain support for the location of the hospital here.

The drive will hopefully be a combined effort with the many local service clubs and organizations in the community, says Beauchamp.

Purpose of the drive, he explained, is to prove to the Greater Detroit Hospital Council that Farmington Area residents want and need a local medical hospital.

THE PETITION also urges the support of local, county, state and federal governments in application for funding from the Hill-Burton grant.

The Hill-Burton grant will provide federal funds for 50 per cent of the cost of constructing a hospital. Support will also be sought from Michigan's two senators and congressmen in Washington, D.C.

Beauchamp says the Jaycees would like to obtain at least 20,000 signatures of residents to support the regional hospital concept.

Doctors wanting to construct the regional hospital have expressed an interest in the township site because of its accessibility to expressways.

The Farmington chapter, sponsored by Farmington Lodge 51 of the Masons, was founded in 1963 and has a membership of 75 boys ages 14-21.

Geraghty Helps Wayne Win Clean Air Car Race

A Farmington man teamed with three other Wayne State University students to win the 1970 Clean Air Car Race.

Brian J. Geraghty, of 27331 Farmington Rd., was one of four students driving a modified Mercury Capri in the cross-country race.

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Geraghty is a candidate for a master's degree in industrial engineering at WSU and a Ford employee.

Object of the 3,600-mile seven-day race from Cambridge, Mass., to Pasadena, Calif., is to spur interest among students, automakers and the public in the search for a practical low emission automobile.

The Capri, furnished by the Ford Motor Co., and powered by a modified 302-cubic inch V-8 engine burning lead-sterile fuel (more lead-free than unleaded gas), converted its record while on the road.

• Earned 997 of a possible 1,000 points for driving each of

the seven legs very close to the allotted time specified by the CACR rules committee;

• Topped all entrants with 797 of a possible 1,000 points in a performance test covering acceleration, braking, noise level and simulated urban driving conditions.

• Scored 943 of a possible 1,000 points on fuel economy, averaging more than 23.5 miles per gallon, while being tested between Ann Arbor and Oklahoma City;

• Tied with two other entries for best and lowest overall emissions in a test at Cambridge and did exceptionally well in subsequent tests in Detroit and Pasadena.

Modifications made by the students to the big winner included installation of an electric "in-tank" fuel pump, an exhaust gas recirculation system, a spark delay valve, a controlled environment engine, a better air cleaner and dual carburetors in addition to stabilizing the air-fuel ratio of the standard two-barrel carburetor.

Milliken Proclaims Children's Aid Week

Sept. 20 through 26 has been declared Michigan Children's Aid Society Week by Gov. William G. Milliken. State Sen. Robert L. Richardson (R-35th District) will present the proclamation to Charles D. Malloch, MCAS President, at the Sept. 18 meeting of the agency's state board of trustees.

The proclamation reads: "During 79 years of providing child welfare services in Michigan, the Michigan Children's Aid Society has met the increasing needs and demands each year."

"The society has placed for adoption in 1969 over 1,600 children, provided foster care for over 2,800 dependent or neglected children and provided counseling and assistance to 2,500 unmarried parents."

"A statewide agency that is nonsectarian and voluntary, the Michigan Children's Aid Society is expanding in nearly every county to develop family service counseling centers."

"Therefore, I, William G. Milliken, governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby proclaim Sept. 20-26, 1970, as Michigan Children's Aid Society week in Michigan, and urge every Michigan citizen to recognize the worthwhile service being performed by this invaluable organization."

An open house will be held each of the days, Sept. 20-26, located throughout the state, including the Michigan headquarters in Farmington.

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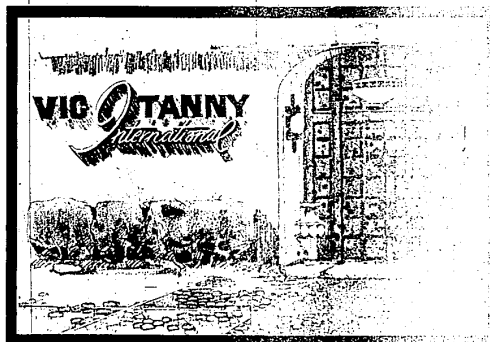
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
