and state police investigators. Plunkett said the accused officers had every right not to talk with investigators. "But there were other officers who were in no danger of being accused of any crime who refused to make statements or talk with us," the prosecutor said.

Plunkett described the re-fusal of policemen not in dan-ger of self-incrimination to cooperate as "a serious under-mining of law enforcement pro-cedures."

The prosecutor said he hoped the township police administrators would check into the behavior of the baking policemen and "would attempt to correct this."
