The big green door has opened on a new season, and the welcome mat is definitely right side up.

"Today is that tomorrow you planned for yesterday... or were you too busy?" is an introduction to the theme of a stimulating new course to be offered at Farmington Community Center on Tuesdays, 7:45 to 9:45 p.m., beginning Oct. 6.

The Exciting Challenge of Estate Planning is a seven-session seminar organized and moderated by Mrs. Amy von M. Morse, herself a thorough going expert in estate planning.

"The popularity of this course, begun two years ago, has convinced me how right I was about the great need for this kind of program," Mrs. Morse remarked.

Joining her for the series will be Ervin (Bud) Witters, CPA, of Parker Witters and Co., who will answer the question "Have I taken advantage of all the tax breaks?" and John E. Park, vice president of Detroit Bank and Trust, whose topic will be "What Benefits Does a Trust Offer Me?"

In ensuing weeks, Eric A. Wiltshire, CLU of Equitable Life Assurance Society, will discuss "Ten Excellent Ways to Use Life Insurance," and James Avery Smith, of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner, and Smith, will explain "Opportunities and Dangers in Today's Stock Market."

Jerome D. Rutledge, president of Holmes Harmon Corp., will deal with "Real Estate Investments" and John A. Gilray, attorney with Miller, Canfield, Paddock, and Stone, will pose the question "Do You Really Like Probate?" Fee is \$15 single or \$25 per couple.

MRS. MARILYN RIOPELLE, by popular request, will bring her Hatha Yoga series to the center Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 9 p.m., beginning Sept. 22.

Students find physical and mental improvement through postures, breathing, and relaxation. Fee is \$20 for 10 sessions.

Problems of ecology will be faced on Thursday evenings at 8 p.m. in a course conducted by Earl Neek, naturalist from Seven Ponds Nature Center.

The class will receive basic knowledge of ecological principles as they relate to today's problems of conservation, pollution, population, public health and welfare. Fee is \$20 for one, \$35 per couple.

Rapid reading will be offered once again for seniors wishing to cope more effectively with the mountains of college study materials waiting in their near futures as well as for business or professional people who have great quantities of reading matter to wade through.

Bargain price for the course is \$85, and it may be had on Mondays or Tuesdays from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

OIL PAINTING WITH Marvin Beerbohm may be studied Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 10 p.m. or mornings from 9:30 a.m. to noon. Adults or high school seniors and juniors may enroll.

Beerbohm has taught and exhibited throughout metropolitan Detroit for many years, and his work which includes the Detroit Public Library murals, has captured many admirers.

Miss Cindy Dinau will introduce an art course for youngsters from seven to 11 years of age on Wednesdays from 4 to 6 p.m., beginning Sept. 30.

A senior at Our Lady of Mercy High School, Miss Dinau was recognized this past year with a certificate of merit, and she has studied for two years at the Detroit Institute of Arts. Her emphasis will be on drawing and painting with a \$15 fee (plus materials) for the 10 sessions.

Knitting for beginners is another new offering this fall, beginning Sept. 24. (Tuesdays) from 1 to 3 p.m. with Mrs. Carol Sheldon as instructor.

Knitters will learn basic stitches, terminology, and how to follow patterns. They will complete a sweater, vest, afghan, or other article of their choice.

Mrs. Sheldon has a bachelor degree in home economics from Eastern Michigan University. She has taught in Ypsilanti and Farmington schools and on the island of Jamaica.

BEAD FLOWER MAKING is a new addition to this season's brochure and will be taught Thursdays from 1:15 to 3:15 p.m., beginning Sept. 24, by Mrs. Marianne Wood.

Dr. Thelma Grey James will return this year with six sessions on comparative religious Thursdays from 10 a.m. to noon.

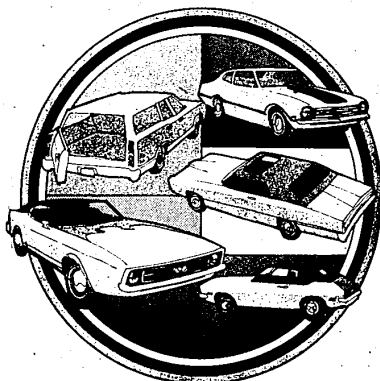

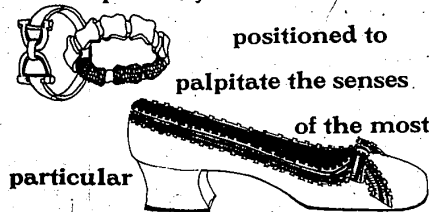
