## Chicks to get a home from 4-H members

The Wildlife Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources will make day-old pheasant chicks and 10 pounds of feed available to Oakland County 4-H youth.

The 4-H Pheasant Habitat Program

is designed to create an awareness of the need and value of basic habitat for pheasants on lands where modern farming techniques have eliminated pheasant cover and food. This program also provides a learning experience of pheasant rearing husbandry for the

youths involved.

The 4-H Habitat Program provides participating 4-H members with 10-35 pheasant chicks in exchange for the retention of creation of a minimum of three acres of habitat. A combination of winter cover, winter food, and nest-

ing cover is required. The chicks will be available from May 15 to June 15.

## Scholar-in-Residence is historian, journalist

A distinguished officer of the Israeli Air Force who is a historian and journalist will be the Detroit Zionist Federation's 1986 Scholar-in-Residence. Col. Uri Dromi will be in the metropolitan area and available to speak to

Jewish and non-Jewish organizations and groups from March 21 to April 14. Among the topics he will discuss are: "The Israeli-Arab Conflict," the "History of Zionism," "Zionism — Where Do We Go From Here?," "Israel's National

Defense," "Israel and the Diaspora," "Radicalism and Extremism in Israeli Society" and others.

A Sabra (native Israeli), Dromi is a "cum laude" graduate in history from the Negev University and is presently a doctoral candidate. He is editor-in-chief of the Ma'arachot Magazine and was chief of education for the Israeli Air Force. He is also a lecturer in the Department of Israeli History of Tel Aviv University.

From 1975 to 1978 he was a member of the Advisory Council on Arab Affairs to Prime Minister Rabin. He has travelled abroad on various Air Force missions some 30 times between 1968 and 1984.

Dromi is a member of the executive board of the Israeli Society of Military History.

Initiated in 1972, Scholar-in-Residence is a program that brings Israeli

scholars and intellectuals to the U.S. to spend two weeks in American communities.

They come as guests of the Jewish community to speak with a cross-section of the population about life in Israel from their own perspective.

The program is a way to introduce American Jews to the spectrum of thought and opinion presently in Israel and to educate them about aspects of Israeli society.

Personal views, matters of mutual interest and areas of the scholar's interest are included in the discussions. The program is co-sponsored by the American Zionist Federation and the American Zionist Youth Foundation. Henry Fain is chairman of the program. Norman Naimark is DZF president.
