A key section of Garden City's mas-ige parlor ordinance has been de-lared unconstitutional by Wayne ounty Circuit Judge Patrick Duggan.

section of the ordinance, adopted on Sept. 5, 1972, by the city council, ille-gally discriminated against women employees of massage parlors.

Botsford has participated in HAS programs for six years.

MONITREND data are used regularly to make management decisions for budgeting, staffing and service.

The ordinance prohibits woman employees from giving massages to male patrons, a prohibition which violates the federal and state constititional provisions, Duggan said.

The ordinance violation was issued to Angel Morales, owner of Yo Ko Oriental Spa, on Ford west of Middlebelt.

THE CIRCUIT court appeal was in-tiated after Garden City District Judge Ritchard Hammer convicted Morales. While admitting that female employ-ers gave massages to two men. Spen-cer's argument was based on the claimed unconstitutionality of the ordi-nance which in this case deprives a comma massage parter employee of comployment opportunities.

The two men were plain-clothed police officers.






