Valeria Petrini Wins Scholarship

FARMINGTON Valeria Elisa Petrini, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Mario Petrini of Oak Pointe, Farmington, has been awarded a \$1200 college scholarship by the Wurlitzer Foundation.

Miss Petrini was an editor of the school paper at Cass Tech High School in Detroit where she was an honors graduate, wrote for the yearbook, and participated in basketball, field hockey and swimming.

Six high school seniors throughout the country are recipients of Wurlitzer scholarships. The scholarships give recognition and encouragement to children and grandchildren of employees of The Wurlitzer Co. who show the greatest promise of future contributions to the life and welfare of their community, as indicated by their present scholastic achievement and interest in and contribution to worthwhile community service.

Miss Petrini is the granddaughter of Joseph Colombatto, Detroit, who has been with The Wurlitzer Co. for 43 years. Starting as a salesman for the Detroit Wurlitzer store in 1927, Colombatto subsequently served as department manager, merchandise manager, sales manager and store manager.

Wurlitzer scholarships are renewable for an additional three years providing the student maintains a satisfactory level of achievement in both academic and community activities.

Miss Petrini plans to major in journalism or psychology and minor in Languages at the University of Michigan.

Richard P. Schultz, 31518 Nestlewood, Farmington, a June 1970 Miami University graduate, was one of six young men who earned the Albee Pomeroy Award of the University's Dept. of Political Science and one of 15 recipients honored by the department for achievement during the 1969-70 academic year.

Schultz, who received his degree in political science from the College of Arts and Science, gained this recognition through

this award, established at Miami in 1949.

The winners of the Pomeroy Award, The Howard Wise Award, The David Caputo Government Award and The Gary L. Best Memorial Award, all non-monetary, are voted by the faculty of the Political Science Dept. upon recommendation of individual faculty members. Each has become an annual award in recognizing students for outstanding scholarship and campus leadership. This year 11 of the 15 receiving awards are members of the honors program, a university scholarship program.
