# All Oriental spas closed

The five Oriental health spas raided by Farmington Hills Police five months ago on suspicion of alleged Illegal sexual activity are all closed as of this week.
"I would perceive no problem in the future with spas where Illegal activity would take place," Farmington Hills Police Chief William Dwyer sald Tuesday.

The last spa, Tokyo Oriental Health Spa, 28841 Orchard Lake, was closed on Monday, the same day the much-debated Farmington Hills massage regulation ordinance went into effect.

"We are pretty excited. We have closed the last health spa down." Dwyer sald. "They (Tokyo operators) were informed to cease and desist the operation of their business. It appears they have ceased and desisted."

City attorneys sent the operators of the Tokyo spa a letter March 6 informing them the city clerk would not Issue

ing them the city clerk would not issue a 1986 business license, Dwyer said.

## Police can be sued for bad warrants

Farmington-area police officials have a mixed reaction to a U.S. Supreme Court rolling that an officer who obtains a warrant for an unconstitutional search or arrest may be forced to pay damages to the victim.

In a unanimous ruling handed down March 5 in a Rhode Island case, the justices said an officer can be held lia-

ble even if he believes he acted within the law or even if the judge who signed the warrant erred. The court previous ty gave absolute immunity to all judical officers, including judges and prosecutors, acting in their official capacity.

"It's wrong for a police officer act-ing in good faith to be held liable when the prosecutor and a judge must first review information presented for a warrant," Farmington Hills Police

Justice Byron White, writing for the court, sold an officer could be held liable if an impartial person found it 'obvious' that no "reasonably competent officer" would have sought a warrant that turns out to be unconstitutional.

THE STANDARD is aimed at "the plainly imcompetent or those who knowingly violate the law," White

Dwyer acknowledged there are times when a warrant is defective and successfully challenged in court. "But I don't feel it's proper for a police officer to be held liable," he said.
"Police officers are trained in criminal investigations, but they don't go through law school. They know criminal law, but when it comes to identify-
