In reaction to the health spa raids and subsequent arrests, Farmington fills City Council adopted a massage regulation ordinance in February to regulate the massage business.

The ordinance allows massages to be provided by members of the opposite sex, but requires massage therapists and the businesses for which they work to obtain operating permits. But the ordinance also exempts those therapists who are members of the state's two certified massage associations.

THE NEW ordinance, Dwyer sald, gives police the investigative authority to help regulate massage businesses in

Non-regulate imassage ousinesses an the city.
Non-exempt businesses providing body massages must comply with business license and operating permit provisions and operating and inspection fees. The ordinance also addresses the layout of the business where massages will be provided, the need for the business to meet certain health-related provisions and the kind of apparel massage therapists must wear. Violation of the ordinance is a misdemeanor that upon enviction earries a penalty of up to a \$500 (tine and 90 days in jail.
