Even though a psychiatrist recom-tended that a man divorce his wife berecourse she was giving him psychological problems, the tax court ruled his di-vorce lawyers' fees were not deducti-ble as a medical expense.

A landscape architect was told by the IRS that he could not deduct the cost of maintaining his front yard as part of a home office expense.

A Las Vegas man was told by the tax court that he could not deduct \$140,000 he was duped out of. He had lost the money participating in an illegal scam to purchase \$1 million in stolen cash.

If you sell a Christmas tree that you've grown for more than six years, it's eligible for long-term capital-gain treatment.

IRS agents were threatened with vio-lence more than 1,000 times last year by Irate taxpayers. As a result, the IRS awarded a \$59,842 contract to a re-

search company that will study the profile of taxpayers most likely to commit violence against the taxman.

No foolin'— in fiscal 1985, 543 tax-payers were penalized almost \$2 mil-lion for using delay tactics or filing frivolous returns. A fine of up to \$5,000 can be imposed on someone who tries to make a fool of the IRS.
