

Going into the NCAA Division II championship swim meet, Oakland University's men's swim coach Pete Hovland figured his Pioneers would finish among the top five teams in the

finish among the top five teams in the nation. Third was certainly within reach and, if everything broke just right, perhaps even second.

The Planeers did swim fairly well last weekend in Orlando, Fla. And it's a good thing they did. They needed it in what proved to be a very fast meet to secure third place.

California State-Bakersfield won the team title with \$49 points, ending California State-Northridge's four-year reign as champion. Northridge was second with 438 points, followed by OU with 335 and University of Tampa with 321. Clarlon State was fifth (228.5).

A TRIO of second-place finishes highlighted OU's performances during the final two days of a competition in which several records were busted. Sophomore Bruce Verburg placed sec-
