

The American Cancer Society will spend \$85 million on cancer research in 1988. The massive commitment, \$16 million more than the \$69 million spent on scientific and medical studies in 1985, constitutes 30.2 percent of the speciety's total budget.

Barr, state president of the ACS.

The ACS 1986 statistical survey, "Cancer Facts & Figures," estimates that 34,500 cases of cancer will be diagnosed in Michigan in the coming year, and that an estimated 17,200 men and women will die of the disease.

For the second year, breast cancer has fallen behind lung cancer in estimated causes of cancer death among women. This rising trend of lung cancer among women is believed to reflect the pace at which women have taken up cigarette smoking, while the includence of breast cancer in the U.S. has remained fairly constant over the past 50 years.
