PARKS AND recreation development is considered as significant as proposed road improvements in the six-year plan.

In addition to the one-mili tar in-crease in 1986-67, voters also will be asked on Tuesday, June 24 to consider approval of a special 0.5-mill levy for five years to pay for development of parks and recreation facilities. As a special levy, the proposed 0.5-mill would not be included in the city's maximum 10 milis.

The proposed special levy is expected to garner in excess of 33 million over the next five years to develop recreational facilities, including Hertiage Park, the former Spicer property.

The remaining .55-mill (of the 1.65 mills for capital improvements) would finance other improvements suggested in the current year of the lix-year plan. Farmington Hills property owners will pay a total of 10.3 millis this year if council adopts the proposed \$10.3 millis flictuding 1 mill for roads and .55-mill for other capital improvements) and the 0.5-mill special park levy wins voter approval.
