## U-D stipends offered

Beginning this summer all elementary and secondary Catholic school teachers, administrators and counselors are eligible for half-tuition scholarships to the University of Detroit.

By instituting a scholarship for parochial school teachers, "U-D will increase its contribution to Catholic education by encouraging teachers at the secondary and elementary level to do advanced course work or earn master's degrees," said the Rev. Leo Lackamp, U-D's director of admissions. Lackamp estimates that only half of today's Catholic school teachers hold master's degrees.

U-D anticipates that the scholarship will enable Catholic school teachers to afford advanced education. Many of them make lower salaries than their public school counter-

parts, Lackamp said.

Eligibility for the scholarship program remains as long as a person continues employment in a Catholic school. The scholarships may be used for all undergraduate and graduate coursework other than law, dental, MBA and doctoral programs.

Four thousand letters announcing the program were mailed to area parochial schools last week with another 1,500 hand-delivered by university admissions staff. They followed earlier announcements last month.

In his letter, U-D President Robert Mitchell wrote: "The University of Detroit is committed to offering quality education; quality which is reflected in the excellence of its professors, the size of its classes and the wealth of its academic offerings. Because we know that you share in our goals of excellence, we hope that this

Already a number of school personnel have expressed enthusiasm for the idea. Sister M. Leanne, principal at Regina High in Harper Woods, wrote a letter to Mitchell: "I am grateful to you for initiating this type of program and commend both you and the University of Detroit on your support of the Catholic school system, Catholic school educators, and more importantly, Catholic education, God Bless."

## Purchasing change in works

The first step toward a change in Farmington's purchasing ordinance — increasing the amount of expenditure requiring competitive bidding from \$1,000 to \$4,000 — was taken by city council May 19.

Unanimous approval by council members introduced an ordinance specifying this amendment. The change reflects an amendment to the City Charter in November 1979. The city code was never amended to reflect

the change, causing city administrators to go out for bid on all items of more than \$1,000.

"Although believe the charter supersedes the city code, we believe the ordinance should be consistent with the provisions of the charter," City Manager Robert Deadman told the council in his report.

"Quite often, we make competitive bids for items under \$1,000," he added.

## Harrison's band on midway

The Farmington Harrison High School Marching Band will entertain guests on Sunday, June 1, at Cedar Point, Sandusky, Ohio.

The 80-member marching band will perform at 11 a.m. under the direction of Mark Phillips. The band will perform along the midway.

"This is a special performance for the band and a treat for our guests," said Jack Aldrich, director of park attractions at Cedar Point. "The band enjoys the excitement of performing along the midway. Afterward, they can spend the rest of the day in the park."

With 54 rides, Cedar Point is one of the largest ride parks in the world. New this season is Thunder Canyon, a 1,600-foot river rafting ride. The \$3.5 million ride creates the adventure of white water rafting.

Also new this year is the IMAX motion picture, "The Dream Is Alive," which allows audiences to view space travel as the astronauts do. Narrated by Walter Cronkite, the 37-minute movie uses footage filmed on board several 1984 space shuttle missions.

Description of Project: The Applicant would utilize an existing dam owned by the Charter Township of VAN Buren. The proposed project would consist of: (1) a concrete dam approximately 355 feet long and 38 feet high; (2) an existing powerhouse, which is an integral part of the dam, containing one proposed generating unit rated at 1,400 kW; (3) an existing reservoir with a surface area of 1,470 acres and a storage capacity of 17,700 acre-feet at powerpool elevation of 638 feet M.G.V.D.; (4) an existing outlet channel approximately 100 feet long with a variable width; (5) a proposed 4,160 volt transmission line; and (6) appurtenant facilities. The estimated average annual energy output for the project is 8,800,000 kWh.

Purpose of Project: Power produced at the project would be sold to the Detroit Edison Company.

This notice also consists of the following standard paragraph: A3, A9, B, and C.

A3. Development Application—Any qualified developer applicant desiring to file a competing application must submit to the Commission, on or before the specified comment date for the particular application, a competing development application, or a notice of intent to file such an application. Applications for preliminary permit will not be accepted in response to this notice.

A9. Notice of Intent—A notice of intent must specify the exact name, business address and telephone number of the prospective applicant, include an equivalent statement of intent to submit, if such an application may be filed, either (1) a preliminary permit application or (2) a development application (specify which type of application), and be served on the applicant(s) named in this public notice.
