Adventure School names headmistress

Mary Bramson Van der Tuin has been appointed headmistress of The Adventure School for Children With Learning Disabilities in Birmingham. Van der Tuin will join the school early in July, replacing Gary Pedersen, headmaster and founder in 1989 of the only accredited school in Michigan which exclusively serves children with learning disabilities.

A former Michigan resident, Van der Tuin comes to The Adventure School from Pensacola, Fla., where she has been search coordinator for Independent Educational Services, in Princeton, N.J. In this capacity, she served as search consultant to schools for the learning disabled.

Prior to her move to Florida, Van der Tuin was headmistress from 1980 to 1985 of Kingswood School Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, where she headed the 8th-12th grade boarding and day schools. While at Kingswood, she accomplished a redirection of the Kingswood School mission and programs.

From 1975 to 1980 she directed the upper school program of Spring-side School, Chestnut Hill, Pa. Her administrative roles have always included teaching.

Earlier, she taught at Cambridge School of Weston, Mass., St. Dunstan's Episcopal School, St. Croix, and in a program for academically

talented students at Marple-Newton High School in Pennsylvania.

In addition to her administrative and teaching background in both public and private schools, her experience includes 23 years in the field of education, including supervision, curriculum development, public re-

lations, school board membership and fund raising.

Van der Tuin's own experience as a parent of a learning disabled child has made her acutely aware of the importance of helping these capable young people to prepare for work, career, self-sufficiency and satisfac-

tion in their lives. She is pleased that the movement to educate and enrich the lives of children with learning disabilities is gaining momentum. The Adventure School is a non-profit day school at 1775 Melton, Birmingham, serving youth in all surrounding communities.
