Artists and Artisans join for 2-day festival

The Michigan Guild of Artists and Artisans, in conjunction with the City of Plymouth, announces the fourth Annual Spring Arts Festival in Kellogg Park, Plymouth, during

Father's Day June 14-15.

This juried two-day arts festival will feature the exhibition and sale of the work by over 100 fine artists and crafters from Michigan and

throughout the midwest. The wide variety of media represented in this festival includes painting, jewelry, wood and wood toys, fibers, glass and ceramics.

A special feature of this year's fair will be several demonstrations by artists of their work. John Hyde, known as "The Clackston Carver," will demonstrate his 35 years of expertise in transforming logs into decorative decoys of ducks, geese, swans and shorebirds.

Steve Olawski of Ann Arbor will demonstrate techniques involved in making raku pottery. This dramatic process of firing a pot, then submerging it into a pile of straw or sawdust results in elegant ceramic pieces with a "crackled" appearance.

Other demonstrators at the fair will include Ron Bishop, a blacksmith from Ypsilanti who will demonstrate a variety of smithing skills; Susan Wright, a weaver from Ann Arbor; Tom Legault, a painter from Plymouth; Simon and Joy Tarasiewicz, toymakers from Grand Rapids; and Irving Tasco, a caricaturist from Southfield.

Another highlight of the fair will be the "Art Dollars" raffle. There will be a total of \$300 given away to the winners of the six raffle drawings, to be used towards purchase of the artwork of their choice at the fair.
