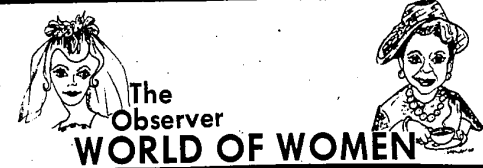

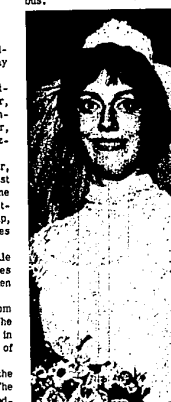
Mrs. Allen selected a pale blue silk gown, and Mrs. Hayes wore a dress of pale green crepe.
