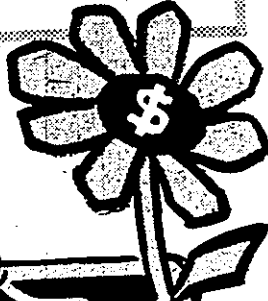




WILLIAM C. PRISK
