## SC Adopts Plan; Funds Unblocked

A master plan for the continued development of the Schoolcraft Community College campus has been approved and accepted "in principle" by the trustees.

Delayed acceptance of the plan, which is a prerequisite for obtaining state and federal funds to assist construction, has prevented the college from receiving that money for more than a year.

Until their regular monthly meeting Sept. 23, trustees had refused to accept proposals for their contract architectural firm, Perkins and Will of Ohio. Changes directed by the board were included in the plan presented by the firm Wednesday. Typographical errors in the formal report caused it to be returned for corrections, but it will be available within a week.

TRUSTEES accepted the plan's principles after Kenneth Lindner, college vice president for business, explained that they need not follow its prescriptions to the letter.

Blood Flow Clues Found

Nerves may affect local blood flow says Michigan State University physiologist Joe M. Dabney.

Blood flow is greatly influenced by the salt concentration of fluids which surround blood vessels. This is one reason doctors are concerned about controlling the salt content in the diet of a person with hypertension or other disease that affects the blood transport system.

It seems, says Dr. Dabney, that certain salts affect blood flow by first affecting nerve action.

are going to have 10,000 students," he said. "Adjustments are possible based on contingencies of the time any projects are scheduled."

New buildings, parking lots, roads, athletic facilities and other general physical features are placed on prospective sites. Building schedules, prospective costs and other particulars are included.

The college currently serves about 5,000 students and expects to reach a peak of 10,000 in 1980.

IN THE MASTER plan report, architects contemplated current campus space usage. "It's somewhat phenomenal the efficiency with which space is being used by this campus now, 80 per cent

compared to 60-65 per cent on most campuses," emphasized a member of the firm.

The report also stated that development is based on usage of facilities 10 hours per day, 51 days per week, "which is about all the mileage you can expect to get out of them."

The report stated, "It's necessary to build heavily in the early stages in order to meet deficiencies and to keep pace with enrollments."

Officials had expected to begin construction of a new 55,000 square-foot facility next year, but are reassessing finances in light of employee contract settlements.
