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Torch Drive Campaign Begins In Farmington

The 1970 Torch Drive is underway for neighborhood stores, offices, plants and other businesses in the Farmington area.

Announcement that campaign solicitations are in progress came from Thomas C. Page, chairman of the metropolitan unit, one of six major Torch Drive chapter groups.

Formed last year, the metropolitan unit includes the former community business, school and governmental campaigns.

On announcing the neighborhood business kickoff, Page, a Dearborn resident and

general manager of Autolite-Ford Parts Division of Ford Motor Co., said:

"Throughout this three county metropolitan area, our neighborhood businesses traditionally have supported the annual United Foundation campaign."

"I am confident we can count on their giving generously again this year."

He said that approximately 27,000 community businesses in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties will be canvassed in coming weeks.

These solicitations precede the official opening of the 22nd annual UF campaign, set for Oct. 13 through Nov. 5.

Nearly 200 health and community services in the tri-county area will benefit from the campaign's \$29,750,000 goal.

Neighborhood business solicitations annually bring in approximately \$500,000 of the Torch Drive total.

Page said that each business which gives to the 1970 drive will receive a certificate for window or wall display to indicate it is a contributing sponsor of this year's campaign.

SERVING WITH Page as metropolitan unit group chairman are Peter E. Gilezan of Grosse Pointe Woods, Ronald H. Fournier of Royal Oak and Harrison T. Price of Brighton. Gilezan, who is responsible for business solicitations in Detroit, is staff executive of Chrysler Corp.'s U.S. Automotive Manufacturing Group.

Fournier, urban manager of Consumers Power Co., Ferndale, will direct the community business canvass in Eastern Oakland and Macomb.

Price, whose campaign assignment is neighborhood businesses in Western Wayne and Western Oakland, manages the research and development department of Chevrolet Division, General Motors Corp.

Vandals Hit School

Farmington Township Police are investigating a suspected arson attempt at Larkshire School, 23800 Tuck Road, that occurred sometime over the weekend.

Police officials said officers entered the building after principal James Lanigan reported the school "smelled like smoke" Sunday morning.

Police found a number of charred books in a pile in one of the classrooms and said it appeared the suspects smashed a window in another room to gain entry to the building. They said the culprit ransacked another classroom, scattering school attendance records on the ground outside a window and writing obscene words across the blackboards. Police said playground equipment was also missing from a box on the east side of the building.
