The Kitty Hawk is the second U.S. Navy ship to bear the name of the small North Carolina town feaf which Wilbur and Orville Wright flew the first heavier-than-air manned aircraft on Dec. 17, 1903.

The ship launches aircraft with the aid of four steam-powered catathe aid of four steam-powered cata-pults. Each "cat" can propel a 30-tan jet to a speed of 160 mph in just two seconds, launching at a rate of three
