

Leaf Fires Can Cause \$100 Fine

Farmington residents should remember the city's ban on open leaf and trash burning now that autumn is here.

The smoky-sweet scent of burning leaves or noxious odor of burning trash could cost a homeowner or businessman a fine of \$100 if his offense is reported to the Farmington Department of Public Safety.

The City of Farmington Beautification Committee recommends placing leaves in plastic trash bags to be collected with other household refuse on regular collection days.

With the passing of this new ordinance, it is hoped that Farmington residents and businesses will do their part in helping to create a better environment for themselves.

With the frequent and regular trash pickup provided by the City, there is virtually no need for any outside burning of refuse say beautifiers.

Permits for special circumstances where no other means of disposal are practical may be obtained by contacting the Department of Public Safety. If conditions outlined by the Department are met, the permit will be granted.

DR. RICHARDSON became a member of the Farmington area Jaycees in 1962.

He served the chapter as treasurer, first vice-president, president, chairman of the board, community development

He has been named Jaycee Sound Citizen of the year as well as one of the Five Outstanding Young Men of Michigan, by the state Jaycee organization.
