

Rehab program gets financial boost

A new season of production workshops co-sponsored by the Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission and MetroVision of Oakland County are scheduled to begin in September.

However, because of popular demand, the first openings for enrollment are in November, according to SWOCC Executive Director Lark Samouelian.

The workshops, offered free to residents of Farmington, Farmington Hills and Novi, or those who work here or are affiliated with organizations in the communities, provide instruction in studio and remote production.

MetroVision's production equipment is used in the hands-on training. Graduates of the workshops are entitled to use the equipment at will, on a first-come, first-served basis.

Classes in studio production teach how to produce a television show in the studio. The course shows students how to transform an idea into a video, Samouelian said. This means learning to combine all the required components that go into making a production — technical and audio personnel, script, props, publicity and more — and making them flow cohesively.

CLASSES IN remote production teach how to produce a show on location. Samouelian said when environ-

ment cannot be controlled, elements like weather, lighting and traffic patterns present an entirely new set of circumstances that must be taken into consideration.

Both courses are one month long;

each is offered alternate months, beginning with studio production in September. The courses are one night a week for four succeeding weeks and they are held at the MetroVision studio in Farmington Hills. Time is 7-10 p.m.

About 800 people have already completed the workshops. Samouelian said most have been in their early 20s or middle 40s. But people of all ages have enrolled.

Applications for enrollment in November classes or brochures about the workshops are available by calling 473-7266.

MetroVision programming is shown on Channel 12 for a viewing

audience in the three communities.

The production courses are a community service paid for by MetroVision as a requirement of the tri-city cable ordinances. The courses are taught by MetroVision staff.

Adult education registration begins

Full classes for the Farmington/Clarencville Community Education program are slated to begin the week of Sept. 15, according to information from the program's coordinator, Rose Gorvig.

The classes — which are fee or free depending on the student's status — are open to all residents and non-residents. Advance registration at Ten Mile School is being held weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. It will be held after Sept. 1 from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

The program will also be open at the Clarencville Board Office, 2010 Middlebelt, in Livonia weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sept. 2-12, 5:30-7:30 p.m., excluding Friday, Sept. 5.

Academic classes are free to adults 18 years or older who do not have a high school diploma, to those with a general educational development certificate who have not yet earned a high school diploma, or any high school graduate under 20 years of age on Sept. 1, 1986. Senior gradu-

ates receive one free class registration for non-limited-enrollment classes.

High school completion classes in social studies, English, business,

mathematics and science and hands-on experiences in art, woodworking, clothing and floral design are offered.

Leisure activities in both school

districts vary from one-time classes in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and stress management to longer courses in herb gardening, drawing and sketching, business classes and

other recreational activities. Also at the Ten Mile School are free English classes for the foreign-born who can learn to read, write and speak English.

shops and three owners and operators — more than half of which were discovered in southeast Michigan.

The Farmington Hills shop, another Independent Transmissions owned by Schotten in Lansing, and several others were closed Tuesday by an administrative order of the state. A hearing for civil charges against the shop is scheduled for Monday, Aug. 18, in Ingham County Circuit Court.

"We have complied with the spirit of the order," Birmingham attorney Leslie Scheffman, who represents Schotten, said. "The summary action by the state was inappropriate and unconstitutional. . . it violates due process of rights."

As to the criminal charges, he added, "we intend to prove the charges false."

Walter said he "would prefer not to give information" about why the two were "led out for criminal charges because of the nature of the investigation. No other employees of the shop were charged criminally, he said.

Scheffman remains concerned about his client's customers, some of whom have vehicles at Independent Transmissions locations that have now been closed. He said the matter will be discussed during the Monday court hearing in Lansing.

One vehicle remained in the Farmington Hills shop Wednesday morning and several were parked in the lot apparently waiting for transmission work.

Walter suggested customers with vehicles at the shops closed by the state contact the Michigan Secretary of State hotline at 357-5168.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Hartsock at 8:02 p.m. on August 4, 1986, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Campbell, Hartsock, Tupper. ABSENT: Yoder. OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Billing, Director Laubeff, Acting Clerk Murphy.

City Clerk Dushy administered the Oath of Office to newly appointed Councilman Shirley V. Richardson. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved. Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed. Council granted permission for the Huron River Hunting and Fishing Club to erect a tent in their parking lot on August 18, 1986.

Council approved the request of Moore Drive residents to close Moore Drive for a Block Party on August 23, 1986.

Council authorized the City Clerk to cast their vote for the persons nominated for the Michigan Municipal League Fund Trustees.

Council approved funding in the amount of \$313.08 annually for a Michigan Municipal League Public Works Coordinator position.

Council established its intent to adopt a franchise ordinance permitting Consumers Power Company to conduct a gas business in the city for 30 years.

Council waived the normal bid process and authorized a contract with Italia Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$12,314.00 to install a new 5 ft. wide concrete sidewalk on Arandol Street from Longacre School to Gill Road.

Council authorized the allocation of Farmington's proportionate share in the amount of \$2,300.00 to repair the 47th District Court parking lot.

Council budgeted \$11,000.00 to improve Ten Mile Road from Power west to Farmington Road under the Oakland County Road Commission's Two-Party Maintenance Program.

Public comments were heard.

Councilman Tupper was appointed as the Alternate to the Board of Zoning Appeals to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Bennett's resignation.

Councilman Richardson was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Deferred Special Assessment Review Committee.

The following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-536-86

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDERS THAT THE TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDER ISSUED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, DATED FEBRUARY 4, 1971, IS HEREBY AMENDED AS FOLLOWS: CHAPTER 5 SECTION 5.4 AS PROVIDED FOR IN SECTION 2.53 OF THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR CITIES, TOWNSHIPS AND VILLAGES.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Chapter 5. Prohibited Parking

Section 5.4 Power Road

Subsection A. (AMEND to read)

East and west sides from Grand River north to Shawwassee.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on July 21, 1986, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the City Council on August 4, 1986, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.
