# Will Council Expand If Annexation Passes?

FARMINGTON The Farmington City Council has introduced a policy statement supporting a charter revision should voters approve annexation in the Nov. 3 election. The revisions are designed to make annexation more attractive.  
 The policy statement was introduced Monday night, with two councilmen absent, and placed on the agenda for the Oct. 19 council meeting.  
 The proposed charter revisions would expand council membership from five to seven members, reduce the residency requirement to one year and give previous residency credit to those now living in the area proposed to be annexed.  
 AN ELECTION on the charter revisions would be held before next April's city elections, explains Mayor Wilbur Brotherton, so residents in the annexed area would be eligible to run for office and receive proper representation for their areas.  
 Brotherton said the policy statement was drawn up after city councilmen attended meetings at which the proposed annexation was discussed.  
 The proposed charter revisions would be "immediately" placed on the ballot if annexation is approved Nov. 3, added the mayor.  
 Councilman John Allen said the policy statement should indicate the city council is sincere and means to do right by the residents in the township area proposed for annexation.  
 Councilman Ralph Yoder

added that all five councilmen were in agreement with the policy statement.  
 Brotherton said the council wanted to introduce the policy statement Monday night so residents from the city and area proposed to be annexed could attend the Oct. 19 meeting and give their views and ask questions.  
 The mayor said the policy statement will be the first order of business at the next council session.  
 The area proposed to be annexed from Farmington Township to the City of Farmington includes everything south of 10 Mile east of Quakerstown and south of 11 Mile west of Quakerstown.  
 IN OTHER business, the council adopted a motion which stated "no action is now required" on the site location for a counselling center for the Farmington Area Advisory Council (FAAC), the community agency formed to operate drug prevention programs.  
 Brotherton said he was surprised the school board approved the site near the school administrative building and that the city had not received any notification from the schools on the action taken.  
 Brotherton said at a private meeting between councilmen and three school trustees, city officials left with the Impression the Farmington Junior High site would be chosen.  
 The school board made its decision said Brotherton, and postponed moving the building for two weeks for the city to give its stamp of approval.  
 "They are looking for someone to take them off the hook,"
