Injury, inexperience can't dim Bokovoy's spirit

For Lisa Bokovoy, the adjustment from high school star to college player has been frought with tough lessons. But unlike other prey stars who never make a successful transi-tion, Bokovoy's talent has been over-

whelming enough to carry her through the greatest challenges. Bokovoy, from Livonia Stevenson, is on the brink. And she's only a sonhomore.

The 6-foot-1 Bokovoy graduated from Stevenson boasting all-state credentials in both volleyball and softball. She chose to continue her athletic career in volleyball and accepted a scholarship to the University of Kentucky.
