During this time, thousands of poinsettias will be available throughout the area at three Henry Ford hospitals (Detroit, Fairlane, West Bloomfield) and also at Bicounty Hospital, Saratoga Hospital and Detroit Osteopathic Hospital.

There is no known cure for arthritis yet. However, much can be done if proper treatment is sought at the onset of the disease. Educational programs are a necessity, as there are many myths surrounding this disease, such as the myth that

arthritis is an old person's disease.

The foundation is urging businesses and residents to decorate their offices and homes with poinsettias this Christmas, while helping arthritis patients.

The foundation's director of development, Wendy Rose, expects to exceed the goal of \$30,000 in 1986.

"It is our hope that the donations received by us from the sale of these plants will not only brighten the receivers' holiday season, but will also be a reminder that each poinsettia is helping brighten the lives of arthritis patients," Rose said.
