# New Candidate Is Auxiliary Policeman

Joseph T. Brennan, township attorney, said the new write-in candidate is bound by the same rules that apply to other township patrolmen-namely that

they cannot actively campaign for public office with-out first resigning from the force. Rebeck said his decision to run against Earl

Teeples was made only days before the formal an-nouncement. He reiterated that he felt the primary vote, in which Teeples defeated Curt Hall, present

vote, in which Teeples deteated Curt Hail, present township supervisor, was "not a true refletion" of voter feelings. The whole idea, though, was Flattery's. "I felt, and Rebeck agreed, the voters needed a choice of candidates. Now they have that choice," he said.

REBECK AND FLATTERY met last June when Flattery addressed the Farmington Board of Educa-tion against the formation of a Student Mobilization Committee here.

Committee here. "Lou called to congratulate me on that speech." Flattery recalled. "We began talking and found we agreed on many issues. "I knew of his administrative experience with General Motors and asked him to run for supervisor. Lou agreed and we began planning.
