The Rev. James Woodruff, like Carmichael a native of Trialdad, is a member of the Executive Council of the 3:6 million-member Episcopal Church.

THE 34-YEAR-OLD priest was not elected in the usual manner. Instead, the denomination's General Convention decided to give two council posts to the Union of Black Clergy and Laymen of the Episcopal Church Woodruff is executive director of this unofficial — and radically segregated – organization.
