session of the second half, the Hawks drove from their own 43 to the Northern 19 where the drive stalled. Herrington sent Mark Calyarus on to try a 38-yard field goal. Surprise. Harrison quarterback Mark Murray — who is the bolder on field goal attempts — picked up the ball, rolled to his right and drilled a pass to Dave Kroilcki for a critical touchdown.


"We knew before the game that if we faked to the right we had a chance to be successful," Herrington said.

TRICKY WASN'T the Hawks only asset on Saturday. They did a superb job of controlling both sides of the line of serimange against a team of superior size. Harrison checked all-PSL back Arthur Mitchell on just 23 yards. Northern managed all of 54 yards rushing, total. On the other side of the ball, the Hawks managed to grind out 100 yards rushing – 67 accumulated by Bissell.

He completed 16 of 24 masses for 177 yards and two TDs. "Mark was great, wasn't he," Herrington said. "He has a tendency to overthrow and that cost him a couple of times today." Murray had two passes picked off by Dellus Murray's counterpart, Northern quarterback Marcus Honey, was also effective. He completed 13 of 22 yards.
