SEMTA fights reorganization

The Southnast Michigan Transportation Authority board wants SEM and authority. The board would see that a seven-county region at authority. The board worde 94 to oppose Senate Bill 363, which would replace SEMTA with a smaller agency. Supporters of SB 363, which was sponsored by Sen. Richard Fessler, R-West Bloomfield, are working to collect votes in the lame duck session of the Michigan House of Representatives. The Senate passed the bill last spring.

FESSLER'S SB 363, introduced in 1935, is supported by members of the so-called "Big Four" — Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, Wayne County Executive William Lucas, Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy and Macomb County Board

of Commissioners Charman Walter Franchuk. Should the bill pass, SEMTA would be dissolved and could be replaced by three or more separate transit systems.

Critics of SB 363 told the SEMTA board the bill would add layers of bureaucracy involved in operating several transit systems in the region. will be plowed the same day of the storm whenever possible, even at overtime cost. This policy was begun last year in reponse to demand.

More than \$2,000 tons of road delicing rock salt is already in storage at Road Commission garages. Since increasing storage capacity to this level, salt supply hand been a problem despite use of more than 60,000 tons in the last two whiters.

At an average of \$19.45 per ton delivered, salt will cost more than \$1 million.
