Evangelist Billy Walker of Southgate will speak in First Baptist Church of Garden City, Henry Ruff and Marquette, Sunday, Nov. 8. His Sunday address will mark the beginning of a week-long crusade. Meetings are scheduled every evening at 7:30 through Saturday, Nov. 14.

In addition to evangelistic crusades, the Billy Walker Evangelistic Association maintains a Christian conference for teenagers. Walker is conference director of Hiawatha Youth Camp at Platt Lake in Michigan's Northern Peninsula. He is also author of the book "Billy Walker Talks With Teens."

Walker has conducted successful crusades in some of the largest churches in the state. Although only 31, he has spoken to nearly two million people in his crusades and rallies. Walker was raised in a parsonage and studied for the ministry at Wayne State University. At 18, he won the Michigan Peace Oratorical Contest, and later he won the WSU Oratorical Contest. At 21, he was invited to appear at the Marantha Bible Conference program, the youngest speaker ever to do so.

## Cooperative Plan Introduced At OU

Oakland University, Rochester, in a cooperative arrangement with the Midrashah College of Jewish Studies, is offering this year for the first time courses in Hebrew language and culture.

The courses will be taught at Oakland by faculty from the Midrashah, a private, undergraduate institution in Southfield, William Sturmer, Oakland's active vice provost, said.

"We hope this will be the beginning of a long and fruitful relationship between two neighboring educational institutions. This cooperative arrangement will give Oakland the opportunity to offer a number of courses in Hebrew culture and civilization as taught by the highly specialized faculty of the Midrashah and supported by its excellent library holding in Jewish studies," Sturmer said.

A SIMILAR COOPERATIVE arrangement exists in this area between the Midrashah and the University of Detroit. Offered this fall is a course in Hebrew language taught by David Gamiel, assistant professor at the Midrashah. This winter Oakland will offer another course in Hebrew language and one in history, and beginning with the fall 1971, approximately four courses will be offered each term. Literature on the UNICEF program will also be available. All of the pennies collected in the canisters by Halloween trick or treaters are for the United Nations Children's Fund. The money can buy health and a better chance of survival for millions of other children in many parts of the world. A single UNICEF penny will provide six glasses of milk. A nickel means the penicillin needed to cure a child of yaws, a crippling tropical disease.

Householders are asked to have a supply of pennies on hand Saturday night, Oct. 31, since it is better to give several pennies to many children than to give 25 or 50 cents to one. Every child wants to fill his orange and black carton.

Students have been achieved for the fall language course and a waiting list has been established.

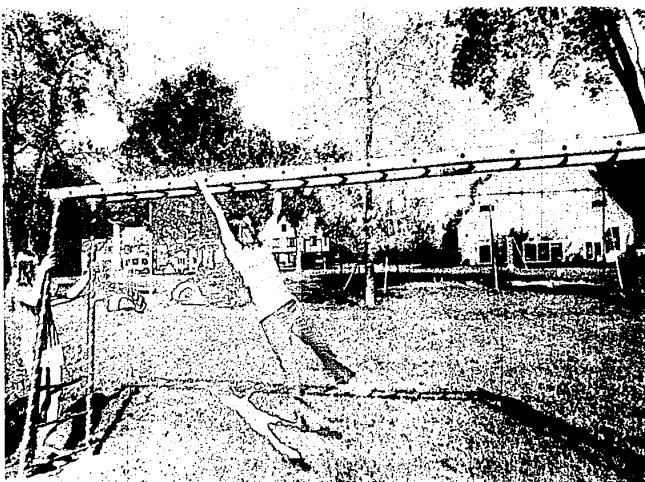

## ALC Meeting Will Choose President

The general convention of the American Lutheran Church in San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 21 to 27, will make decisions with significance beyond its own 2.5 million membership.

Because of the ALC's involvement with other major Lutheran church bodies in the U.S. the election of a new president to succeed Dr. F.A. Scholtz, who will retire, takes on more than parochial importance. There are ten official nominees for the office.

The new president will play significant roles in inter-denominational relationships in which the ALC is involved, both within the U.S. and the World Council of Churches.

Active interest also has developed in the action which the ALC convention will take

on such issues as legalized abortion, selective conscientious objection, ordination of women and other issues. The convention will consist of 1,000 delegates, half clergy and half laity. There will be 40 youth observers.

Also up for decision will be a proposal for major internal restructuring of the denomination. The ALC, with members in 46 states, is divided into 18 geographical districts. It is third in size among Lutherans of the U.S. and ninth in size among U.S. Protestant denominations.

Dr. Scholtz, who will retire as of next Jan. 1, has headed the Church since it was organized by a merger of four smaller bodies in 1960.
