"We were allowed to practice our religion (in Shanghai)," Falbaum said, but we were restricted to the photo. Certainly there were abuses."

Falbaum's father worked as a tailor in Shanghai for nine years before immigration laws opened up in the United States, allowing them to enter.

It was a common route for many "It was a common sole of Jews," Falbaum said, "going from Germany to Shaughai to the United States. So many, that at one time, there was a social club in Detroit of

there was a social club in Detroit of those Jews."
Many of Falbaum's relatives and friends were less fortunate and were lost in the Holocaust. His early memories and experiences, Falbaum said, may have led him to his current project — promoting the zachor, the word and symbol for remember. Re-member the Holocaust.

"We live in disconcerting times. There is an anti-Sentific message being given on a world scale." In terms of comparison with pre-litter Germany, Falbaum said, the neo-Nair movement is much stronger, more sophisticated today.
