Getting lost adds excitement to winery touring

Low threatening clouds, a chill wind, sloppy driving, It is the season to think of visiting sunny California and its wincries.

But which ones? With some 500 to chose among, it is difficult to decide. I suggest that the best way is to select vastly different ones, to see the broad range of their characteristics. Careful investigation and analysis, based on the new IZ sorting technique so fashionable among satisticians, shows suprisingly that, at least among the newer wineries in the state, there are but three basic types. Visit these and you will have a clear perspective on the newer entries in the winery sweepstakes of California.

DIRECTIONS for visiting are purposely vague. Getting lost is half the inn of the adventure. Be assured, however, that if you can find one of these you will find the other two. Here is a bit about each of the three that the sorting technique identifies as prototypic of their kind.

The LeHaron Vineyards, just outside Lido, is the product of its found-

er's ego. He has amassed large sums in private enterprise and has used the making of wine as an expression of a more refined litestyle. Some of the finest laser technology is used to crush and refine his wines. But marketing is the chief strength of this operation. Its slogan is famous: "If you can find a better wine, buy it."

LE BARON PRODUCES but a single wine under its own label. It is a blend of imported Piedmont grapes and locality grown Gamey. It is a hearty wine, robust and full of soft confidence. Most attractive are the selling strategies employed: of-fering rebates on slower-selling items as well as putting much of its

wine in oversized bottles (imperials). The winery staff is unionized and protected under a special pension plan, one designed to achieve maximum employee benefits at minimum cost through the clever use of tax-deferred annuittes. The program has made them especially loyal to their leader.

Representing the second type of winery is Clos de Boutique, along the San Andreas fault near beautiful Hollister on 17.6 acres of treeless

hills. It was begun by owners Bruno and Sadie Klitz following their move from Columbus, Olio. There the were successful operators of a private sanitation firm that served the campus area (badly needed, according to them) but decided in middle age to bring some beauty into their lives that could not be found in Columbus.

"We wanted to live in clean air and scenery, and Hollister was the best place we could afford," said Sa-die recently, adrolly flicking dead fruit flies from the top of the tasting barrel with her thumb.

"OUR CHARDONNAY is our best wine. It goes over well with all our eld friends back in Oblo." Perhaps it is the touch of vanilla extract used that seems to give it a style all its own. "Great at the stadium during a

The third type of winery is Peaceable Kingdom, located high in the Mayacamas Mountains on the Napa-Sonoma berder. It produces only "pure" wines, uses no chemical additives in both vineyard and wineral did only operal to motify the production are hand (and doot) operal did with the vine wineral wine

THE OWNERS have effectively

disdained involvement in the highly competitive whee world. They are content to stay atop their mountain, letting occasional visitors find them to purchase their wares. (The tasting room is run by a Miss Carriage and is only open when she feels right about the whole thing but can usually be viewed on alternate Thursday and Friday mornings, April 1 and the week before Christmas.)

Further, Peaceable Kingdom has eschewed all winery competitions as inconsistent with its spiritual beliefs. Perhaps this decision was helped by an event in 1983 when, at the San Luis Oblipo State Fair, no categories for any of its wines could be found and it was asked to withdraw. Now it really has.

If you go, good touring and tasting to you. You can learn a lot by finding these wineries.
