The radio channel will be the audio for the Farmington, Novi and Farmington Hills governments' new Cable Channel 18. Both are new offerings soon to be activated.

The first radio program is tentatively scheduled to go on-line Monday, Feb. 9. It is the "Mark & Dave Monday Night C.A.R. - Times." (C.A.R. is Community Access Radio.) It will be live from 7-9 p.m. The program will feature local information, light conversation and the best tunes around.

Farmington resident Bob Bolak joins the MetroVision production staff as production assistant. Graduate of Central Michigan University in broadcast and cinematic arts, Bob enthusiastically is spearheading the newly completed radio production facility.
