Listed are some of the Farmington-area police and fire calls received during the past week:

• ASSAULT ALLEGED

A 51-year-old Detroit man is charged with assault with intent to commit murder in Farmington Hills. Arraigned Feb. 9 before District Judge Michael Hand of Farmington, Ralph Salie pleaded not guilty. He is being held in the Oakland County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 cash or surety bond. A preliminary examination of the charge was scheduled for Feb. 18 in 47th District Court.

The charge stems from a Jan. 14 incident involving a 42-year-old Detroit woman and a hunting knife along I-696 near I-75, Michigan State Police Trooper Steven Schook said.

Hand signed a warrant for Salie's arrest Feb. 2. Detroit police arrested Salie Feb. 8, Schook said.

• WATER DAMAGE

Damage was estimated at \$500,000 when an apparent sprinkler head malfunction resulted in extensive water damage in two office suites at Concord Centre, 30003 Northwestern.

Computer, equipment, furniture and files were damaged in the Feb. 9 incident, according to a Farmington Hills Fire Department report.

• 5 ARRESTED

Five young people were arrested Feb. 6 as part of the Farmington Hills Police Department's crackdown on rowdiness along Orchard Lake Road.

Three young men sitting in a car in the alley behind Caboots, 30880 Orchard Lake, were arrested at 10:10 p.m. A 17-year-old Union Lake man and a 15-year-old West Bloomfield youth were arrested for open intoxicants in a car. A 20-year-old Union Lake man was arrested for open intoxicants in a car and possessing suspected marijuana, according to Farmington Hills police. At 10:30 p.m., two 22-year-olds sitting in a car at Ground Round, 30005 Orchard Lake, were arrested. A Farmington Hills man was arrested for driving with a suspended license. A West Bloomfield man was arrested for possessing suspected marijuana, according to police.

• BREAK-IN ALLEGED

Two Detroit men are charged with two counts breaking and entering of an automobile with intent to commit larceny, Farmington Hills police said.

The two — one 21, the other 19 — were arraigned Feb. 5 before District Magistrate Dennis Phency of

Farmington. Innocent pleas were entered in their behalf. Bond was set at \$3,000 pending a preliminary examination in 47th District Court. Conviction could bring a penalty of up to five years in prison or a \$1,000 fine per count.

Their arrests stem from the alleged breaking and entering of two cars — one at Country Glen Apartments, the other at Inverary Condos early Feb. 5. In-dash radios were the intended targets, said Sgt. Dennis Rochford of the Farmington Hills Police Department.

The police department's Special Patrol Operational Team made the arrests.

• VEHICLE FIRE
