Jane Humble Gives Talk

Jane Humble, who recently returned from a three-year missionary assignment in India, will be the speaker at the Wednesday, Oct. 28, general meeting of the Women's Society of Christian Service of First United Methodist Church of Farmington. The meeting will begin at 12 noon in the church, Grand River at Warner.

Mrs. Humble is the wife of Harold Humble, assistant superintendent of Clarenceville School District.

THE HUMBLEs went to India in September 1967 under the auspices of the United

Methodist Board of Missions. Humble was principal of Kodakal School, an inter-denominational school for children of missionaries.

Mrs. Humble worked in the school library, and also helped set up festival programs, chaperone class activities and plan graduation parties and proms. She also worked on the "Skipper" van, a mobile unit which went to villages with medical supplies, food and clothing for the needy. Mrs. Humble reported that sweaters were desperately needed and as a result many friends and churches here have been sending sweaters to India.

ANOTHER OF Mrs. Humble's pet projects was COR-SOCK, an organization to help the needy help themselves by operating small-scale Goodwill-type industries. She was also treasurer for a local hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Humble returned to Farmington in April, 1969. Mrs. Humble has returned to Wayne State University to continue her education. She was an active member of the Women's Society before going to India.

Mrs. Jerome J. Kozlowski, state regent of the Daughter of Isabella and chairman of the candy sale, said members throughout the state will sell "treats" on street corners, in banks, supermarkets, department stores, factories, and various other places of business.

The candy is attractively packaged in colorful puppets,

"Ghastly the Ghost" and "Pete the Pumpkin," containing 100 individually wrapped hard and filled candies, plus "fill'n' treat" bags for little beggars.

THE MOST urgent need is for drugs for patients who have had transplant surgery and require expensive steroid drugs to prevent rejection of the transplanted organs.

There are more than 100 transplant patients in Michigan being supplied lifesaving medication from the drug banks in addition, nephrosis drug banks supply life or death drugs to more than 600 Michigan children and adults.

Science Sharpens Enigmas Of Life, Says CS Lecturer

Radical innovations in biology and other disciplines today sharpen the age-old question, "What is life?" says a Christian Science lecturer.

If life is basically nothing more than a "big biological machine" that can be programmed, then humanity itself is likely to be reduced to automation, Thomas O. Poyser of Dallas recently told an audience in Detroit.

"The concern of biology is with animal life, vegetable life, physical life," he said. "Its effort is to strengthen and prolong these. Certainly attainments in this direction are signs of human progress."

But, Poyser said, some 2,000 years ago, Christ Jesus expressed a view of life quite unlike this one. Poyser reminded his audience of Jesus' statement, "This is life eternal, that they might know the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent."

Jesus emphasized that it is knowing God, Spirit, which gives life, said the lecturer. And this "recognition and acceptance of the nature of life as spiritual is a vital key to stabilizing human existence,"

its individuality and uniqueness," Poyser observed. His lecture was titled "Are You Satisfied With Your Life?"

Poyser spoke of the radical change that a glimpse of life as wholly spiritual brought in the life of Mary Baker Eddy, the woman who discovered and founded Christian Science. "This 'glimpse, or discovery, healed her immediately regarding serious injuries," Poyser explained. "It opened up for her a life of health, action, accomplishment and service for mankind."

The youth of the congregation will sell popcorn and refreshments and there will be a special short feature film for small children.

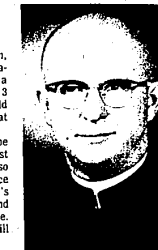
Rosary High Alumni Meet
