

# Baruch Charges Baker On Consumer Protection

Leonard P. Baruch, Democratic candidate for State Representative in the 6th District, charges opponent Raymond Baker with attempting "to destroy the very meager consumer protection we have had in this state since 1966."

At three meetings in Orchard Lake and West Bloomfield Township, Baruch emphasized consumer protection, pointing out Baker's negative vote on the appropriation for the Michigan Consumers Council and announcing his own plan to work with the council.

"My opponent was one of only 18 state representatives who sought to abolish the four-year-old Michigan Consumers Council by voting to delete the council's entire appropriation for 1970-71," Baruch informed the groups.

"We are all consumers—Democrats, Republicans and Independent alike—and we deserve the best protection our state government can provide against fraudulent and deceptive practices," he said.

**BARUCH ALSO** stressed his belief that the Michigan Consumers Council is a crucial state agency that needs to be expanded.

"The council has been struggling against overwhelming odds in its brief existence. With a professional staff of only five persons, there has been neither manpower nor resources available to adequately fulfill its mandate."

"Only two of the five staff members are assigned to handling the complaints of nine million Michigan residents," he said.

**CLAIMING HE** was "shocked" when he learned that Rep. Baker voted to kill the council, Baruch said: "There is substantial difference between being concerned how state revenues are spent and being out-and-out irresponsible."

"The nine-member council was created in 1966 to formulate and direct a program to protect individual consumers from harmful products and merchandise, false advertising and deceptive sales practices, and to formulate and conduct a research and educational program to eliminate fraudulent commercial practices."

The council also is to serve as a central coordinating agency and clearing house for activities and information regarding fraudulent commercial practices, to advise the governor of all matters affecting the interests of Michigan residents as consumers; and to advise the attorney general of any

practice which requires investigation to determine if state laws regulating consumption have been violated.

"I believe that Michigan must increase substantially the capability of the council to do research, produce consumer information materials and handle successfully the complaints of the Michigan consumer," Baruch said.

## To Observe Ed Week

**FARMINGTON** "Shape Schools for the 70s" is the theme for this year's American Education Week to be observed Oct. 25 to 31.

Farmington schools will observe American Education Week in a variety of ways, with open house, with PTA programs devoted to explanations of curriculum, with evaluations of the new report card marking system and with reports on the results of recent Michigan Assessment Tests administered to school children of the district.

## Baker Asks Absentees To Vote

State Rep. Raymond R. Baker (R-Farmington) urges all registered voters who will not be able to make it to the polls Nov. 3 to request an absentee ballot.

Baker pointed out that applications for absentee ballots must be returned to the city or township clerk's office by 2 p.m. Oct. 31. Applications may be obtained by merely calling the clerk's office and requesting one and are, according to state law, a prerequisite for obtaining an absentee ballot.

"This leaves people only a little more than a week to obtain their application, fill it out and return it to their local clerk's office. I think that in the day to day shuffle of normal activities the election is creeping up on people without their realization of how close it actually is."

The ballots will be due by 8 p.m. on Nov. 3.
