In her letter of resignation to the center's board of directors March 13, Paine cited "long hours and the

daily frustrations of dealing with insufficient revenue and the inabil-ity to take appropriate action be-cause of insufficient funds" as rea-sons for leaving the position abe has hold since 1979.
