RU Makes One TD Stand Up To Beat Rocks

Two weeks ago, Plymouth High's Rocks had visions of winning or sharing the 1970 Suburban Six League championship. They had a season record of three wins and a tie in four contests, including two victories over league foes.

Then came the awakening and now the Rocks are out of the race entirely after two league setbacks, the first to Trenton and then a 7-0 upset by Redford Union Friday, 7-0.

The result may have been tabbed an upset by the hundreds of Plymouth grads returning for the traditional homecoming activities. Actually, RU dominated the play most of the way, crossed the goal line twice and once had the ball on the Plymouth one after a long run.

One of the touchdowns was nullified by a clipping penalty and the long run to the one went for naught with a similar penalty.

the lone six-pointer at the 7-33 point of the third quarter. He set it up with a 12 yard lunge through tackle to the Plymouth one and then completed the job on the next play.

Glenn Richmond's placement was good and RU had a 7-0 lead that held up for the remaining time.

The Panthers threatened in the opening frame when an exchange of intercepted passes gave them a first down on the Plymouth 42. Booker and Tim

Mitchell had it on the 31 in two plays. Quarterback Bill Herbert passed to Joe Randolph for a first down on the 22.

RU drew a five yard offside penalty and then Plymouth's Mike Henry grabbed a Herbert serial on the 26 to end the threat.

Late in the second quarter, Plymouth started a march that carried from the Plymouth 33 to the RU 15 where a clipping

penalty moved the ball to the 36. The half ended two plays later.

The Panthers never gave up the ball after taking the second half kickoff until after they had the winning touchdown.

HERBERT RETURNED Tim Grimm's kick to the RU 43. Two plays picked up five before Plymouth drew a 15 yarder for roughness to put the ball on the Plymouth 33.

Booker toiled to the 25 in two thrusts.

Herbert tried center for two and then RU was penalized 15 for clipping to the Plymouth 38.

Mitchell threaded his way down the sidelines for 38 yards to the end zone. The ball was called back and RU penalized 15 for clipping to the Plymouth 23.

CRAIG GOW picked up five yards in two carries and then Combes completed a 24-yard TD pass to Weaver.

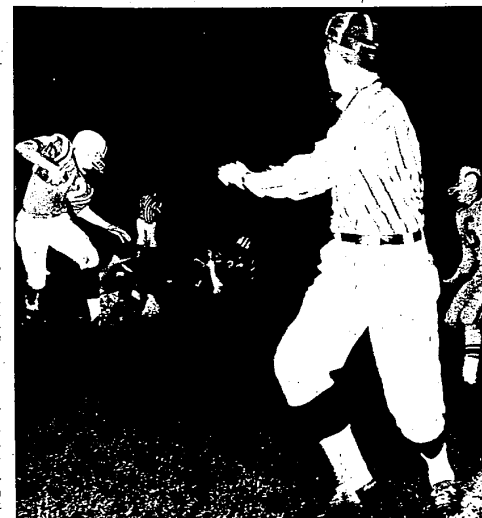
Combes ended scoring for the day at 51-0 on a successful quarterback keeper play that netted two points.

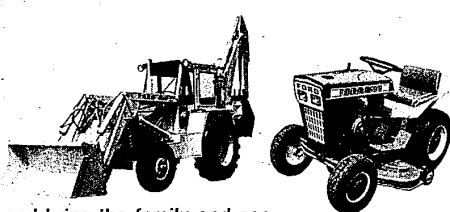

There's an old military axiom that states victory goes to the army with the biggest guns.

That proved to be the case Friday when a speedy, well-experienced Trenton team literally crushed the Bentley Bulldogs 41 to 0, and damped their homecoming.

It was one of the worst defeats ever suffered by a Bentley team that now has won only one game in six starts and that against Dearborn, a non-league opponent.

To make matters worse the Bulldogs meet Redford Union next week and could suffer the humiliation of not winning a Suburban Six game.

ALMOST FROM the opening whistle Trenton dominated Friday's game. Aside from playing good ball control the down river squad uses its speed and ability to find holes in the Bentley line almost at will.

Held scoreless in the first period only because Casey Robertson's touchdown run was called back for clipping.

Trenton took all element out of the contest with three touchdowns in the second period, added two in the third and another in the fourth that left the Bulldogs almost exhausted.

Robertson opened the scoring early in the second period when he took a pass from Dave Cline and raced 35 yards into the end zone. Frank Pizzo went over the line for a two-pointer and as far as Bentley was concerned that was the game.

But Trenton wasn't through. A few minutes later Cline raced around his own left end for 56 yards and a touchdown and before Bentley realized what happened, Steve Ennis intercepted a pass and ran another 58 yards to score.

Gary Vines found the Bulldogs napping and broke through tackle for 37 yards to the 15 yard where Ed Leavell brought him down to deally the agony a little bit. But Cline went over a few plays later on a quarter back sneak and a few plays later intercepted a pass and raced another 80 yards to score.

Tim Van Goethem, a second string quarterback, scored the final touchdown to climax a 60-yard drive.

Bentley tried, but could do nothing with the Trenton forward wall and had to be content with a net gain of 72 yards rushing compared to Trenton's staggering total of 294 rushing and 58 more through the air.

Bentley had some consolation. The homecoming provided the largest attendance of the season, the band never performed better and the class floats were adjudged the best ever to appear in the annual parade.

Brother Rice has been assigned to the regional in Royal Oak while Bishop Borgess will compete close to home at Rouge Park against mostly Detroit public-school teams.
