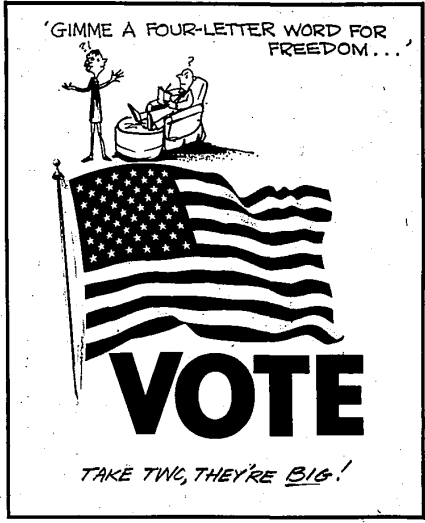

Ford's district including Westland and Garden City, is solidly Democratic, but his record goes well beyond narrow partisan concerns. Known as an energetic and imaginative member of the House Education and Labor Committee, Ford has fought for more funds for public schools in his district.

Ernest Fackler of Dearborn Heights, has campaigned hard against heavy odds. However, his campaign platform lists only the problems of which we are all aware and fails to come up with any solutions to these problems.

Despite this, Wayne II, as it's called, has enjoyed during the two-term incumbency of Republican Marvin L. Esch the kind of representation that has matched well the will of the people in this area.

Thoughtful, intelligent and articulate, Esch is a good politician in the real sense of the term. He has preached congressional reform, consumer protection and aid to education. He has earned respect from his colleagues far exceeding that generally given a man of such limited seniority.
