The chapter was chartered by 30 women who all worked in downtown Farmington in 1952. For a while they met in Salem United Church of Christ, then Farmington City Hall. When the format was changed to dinner meetings, the group met at various restaurants throughout the area, a practice that remains today.

"When we were organized the majority of our members were in the business area of the work force," Way said. "Today the majority are in the professions. Over these 35 years we have seen more and more women entering the job market and making great strides in attaining their rightful place in all areas of business and the professions," she said.

same as it has always been — women helping women." People who wish to attend the an-

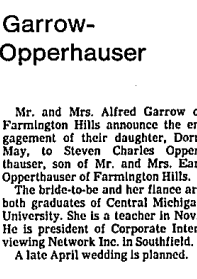

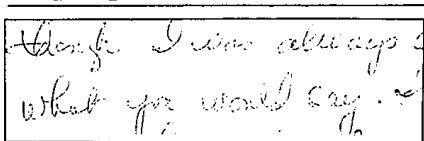
Loops show a need for variety

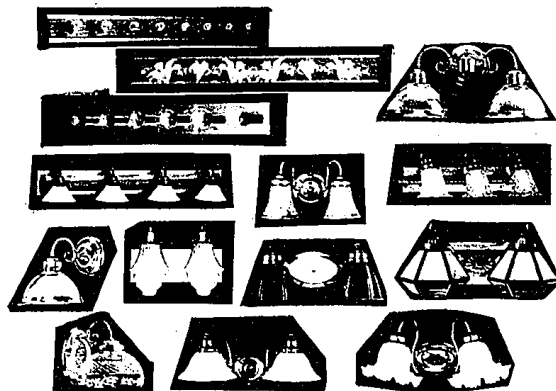
Open swimming, early morning swim, lap swim, swim classes, private lessons, adapted qualties for adults and children and memberships in the adult synchronized swim club are offered.
