different signs that indicate that semething serious may be going on ofter a bump on the head are: finshed, pale, or cool clammy skin; slurred speech er any change in



After any head injury, trust your own instincts. If you just don't feel right, even though you can't pinpoint the exact symptoms, it is better to alect a doctor rather than ignore the neoblem.

FYODOR DOSTOEVSKY introduced the same theme with his famous Grand Inquisitor legend in his novel "The Brothers Karamazov." Humanity cannot tolerate freedom. Humanity cendes the realism and order of the life that only the church can provide.
