There is one major reason for the stock market reacting to the large corporate write-offs by going up instead of down. It is the understanding that the reason so many writer offs are occurring at this time is because of the new tax law.

The tax rate on corporations in 1986 is higher than it will be in 1987. Consequently corporations that might have postponed the write-off to another year are making it in 1986 since the effect is to save more tax money than would be saved by taking the charge in 1987 or 1988. It is my guess that the tax change is the major factor in the large num-ber of "repositioning" charges that are taking place.

ANOTHER FACTOR is that much of industry has been taking a close look at its operations to see what it can do to become more efficient. This has led to decisions to eliminate operations that are not meeting profit note.
